

Lt Col DeWolfe will relate the events of 9/11 from the perspective of the flight deck of Air Force One. The crew had to deal with a number of challenges among them being told that a terrorist announced that the presidential aircraft was the next target, avoiding a potential hostile airliner, being intercepted by Air Force Fighters, the fighters engaging an unidentified threat aircraft and nearly constant rerouting to keep the president safe yet engaged.

Everett is a retired Air Force Officer who spent 28 years in the Air Force with twelve of them being on the crew of Air Force One. He earned the rank of Lieutenant Colonel and the rating of Master Navigator.

Before joining the crew of Air Force One Colonel DeWolfe spent eight years flying our nation's leaders from the Vice President on down. His passengers included Vice Presidents George H. W. Bush, Dan Quayle, and Al Gore. He also flew Secretaries of State George Shultz, James Baker, Lawrence Egelburger, Madeline Albright and Colin Powell. He flew a very visible mission after the end of the first Gulf War returning the American POWs home on an aircraft using the call sign, "Freedom One."

Colonel DeWolfe joined the crew of Air Force One in October of 1993 and served as instructor and evaluator navigator on that aircraft until he retired in April of 2005. He flew Air Force One during the administrations of Presidents Bill Clinton and George W. Bush.

He has more than 7,500 hours of military flight time and 1,100 hours as a private pilot.

Colonel DeWolfe is originally from San Antonio where he graduated from John Marshall High School. He holds a bachelor's degree in Recreation and Parks from Texas A&M University and was a member of the Texas Aggie Corps of Cadets. He holds a Master's Degree in Contract and Acquisition Management from Florida Tech University.

Colonel DeWolfe lost, Molly, his wife of 38 years, to COVID in 2020. He has since remarried to the former Cynthia Thornley. Between them they have six children and ten grandchildren.
