

October 21, 2023 Meeting Notes

Gathering outside the Garden and Arts Center to catch up with each other, discuss current projects and picking through the tendered offerings was quite a pleasure on such a beautiful day. It was almost a shame to go inside for the meeting.

Randy James started the ball rolling by welcoming everyone and proceeding thru the normal introductions, mentioning the online Sargent auction and the upcoming November VRPS convention.

Mike Grimes went into further detail about our convention with perhaps the most important reminder, bring someone new to see what it is all about. The same goes for club meetings. Active participation in the club is needed from all our members. Mike also suggested the possibility of adding a listing about club activities if your local area has a news source that posts events. He will help you with the wording for those notifications if you let him know.

Program chairman Larry Lindsey offered his SGITR question for October.

- Q What is a stealth tower?
- A by Kelly Casey A disguised cell phone tower.

In an effort to make them less of an eyesore, some manufactured towers are made to look like trees, giant cactus, light poles, church steeples and other decorative structures.

Larry then introduced the first of the presenters, Eric Kirst. Eric's presentation revolved around his Edison model D cylinder player that is a family heirloom. It came into his possession during Christmas of 1966 which was a great present as he was already a phonograph enthusiast. His great uncle Arthur had a farm in Michigan who had bought this machine in Detroit around 1908. Eric and his uncles have all tried to permanently fix the model D's spring over the years as it's attachment point is a weak spot. Their suggestion was for him to treat it delicately like an old rubber band and he continues to be gentle with it and it still plays.

Eric continued by reading some of Edison's advertising of the day. One of our favorites included a suggestion that you should buy his machines and give concerts and by charging admission it would pay for itself. Makes you think Edison would be a king on social media.

Eric also covered some of the stages of cylinder development. In 1877, Thomas Edison invented the

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phonograph using a thin sheet of tin foil wrapped around a hand cranked metal cylinder but this wasn't working well and Edison moved to other projects. Then Tainter, Bell, and Bell introduced wax as the recording medium after 7 years of experimentation. It proved successful which brought Edison back to cylinders. In 1889 prerecorded wax cylinders were marketed. They had professionally made recordings of songs, instrumental music or humorous monologues that became known as canned music. Eric ended his presentation by playing several of his favorite recordings.

Richard Shanks was up next and brought in 4 phonographs which he also played several records on each of them.



1 - Columbia Grafonola Favorite from 1911. It's a fairly early inside horn phonograph for Columbia. Only first year models use doors instead of louvers over the horn opening. It sold for \$50 in 1911 which is about \$1,620 in 2023.

2 - Pathe model 60 circa 1914 made in NYC. It can play both Pathe discs which were recorded vertically and regular 78 rpm records that are recorded laterally with an attachment. The sapphire ball stylus did not require a needle change every play.

3 - Victor Victrola Orthophonic portable model 2-55 from 1928. Made entirely of steel, no wood.

4 - Columbia Viva Tonal Grafonola model 162 from 1928.

It was interesting to hear how much the quality and sound level varied between the different records on the same phonograph and between the phonographs themselves. Richard explained changing the steel needles after playing each record is a must, so as to not destroy the record, except on the Pathe model.

Since these two concerts ran a bit long, the meeting time was up and concluded. A few members went up to get a closer look at the machines or ask questions with most everyone else helping with the room clean up.
